An opportunity will be provided for you at Registration to use the new system in a test mode, in the Assembly Hall. I invite you to participate in this exercise.

We are living in difficult economic times and I am aware that some of you are faced with financial hardships. I must therefore draw to your attention that the Office of Student Financing here at Mona is able to provide limited financial assistance to eligible full-time students pursuing undergraduate degree programmes. Financial assistance is also available through the Students' Loan Bureau, the UWI (Mona) and Community Cooperative Credit Union, the National Commercial Bank and the Bank of Nova Scotia. Both of these banks have branches on the Campus.

This Student Handbook was designed especially to provide you with vital information, in one place, on the range of services, facilities and support. It is also meant to be a general introduction to the Rules and Regulations of the University by which you are required to abide and the procedures which it will be in your best interest to follow. You should try to familiarize yourself with its contents and use it as a reference manual.

I hope that the year ahead will be productive, fulfilling and enjoyable for each of you.
