CHAIRMAN'S MESSAGE

The theme for this year's conference and workshop, Violence, Trauma and Development lends itself to multidisciplinary discourses and hence, our collaboration with the Violence Prevention Alliance (VPA) Jamaica. The Faculty of Medical Sciences (FMS) at The University of the West Indies (UWI), by virtue of its clinical, biomedical, allied and public health departments, is well positioned to contribute to this effort.

This year we warmly welcome Professor Jonathan Shepherd as our Sir Kenneth Standard Distinguished Lecturer. Professor Shepherd has had a distinguished career in the United Kingdom (UK) research spanning wound healing and psychological impact of violence and maxillofacial trauma, development of the Shepherd Injury Severity Scale (SISS) and multiagency violence prevention and victim support. His work has led to the Cardiff Model, a successful violence prevention strategy which has been adopted across the UK, is now taking root in the United States and which he will share with us during this conference. We also bring together scholars of epidemiology, geography, sociology, psychology, law, forensic science, physical and neuro-rehabilitation, including our visitors from the Institut Guttman in Barcelona.

With a continued spirit of excellence and as The UWI celebrates its 70th year, this 27th Annual Research Conference and Workshop from the FMS supports the institution's overall mission to advance education, create knowledge and foster development of the Caribbean region and beyond.

We invite you to attend our mainstay series of events the Opening Ceremony featuring the Sir Kenneth Standard Distinguished Lecture on the Epidemiology of Violence; our Scientific Sessions of oral and poster presentations showcasing research being undertaken within and outside the faculty; our theme-based Research Workshop with plenary lecture by Professor Shepherd and our Ethics Seminar on, "Caring for the Vulnerable Patient".
