It has also given us the opportunity for a special homecoming of our distinguished alumnus, Professor Franklyn Prendergast, Director Emeritus of the Mayo Comprehensive Cancer Center. We are excited and grateful that Professor Prendergast will deliver the Sir Kenneth Standard distinguished lecture this year, and I am sure his visit for this event will bring added fervour to the Faculty's drive to strengthen and transform its research operations.

Many have worked hard under the leadership of the Organizing Committee's Chair Dr Christine Walters to make the event possible.
