➤ MASTER OF SCIENCE IN POLITICS AND INTERNATIONAL COOPERATION (MPIC)

The MSc in MPIC is a five year programme offered jointly by three partner institutions, namely the Institut d'Etudes Politiques of the University of Bordeaux in France, the Universite Antilles-Guyane in Martinique and the UWI Mona. Students enrolled in this programme commit themselves to the completion of an undergraduate and a graduate course of studies, culminating in the award of the MSc. qualification but with the interim award of the BSc, once they have completed the requirements for it. The MSc comprises written/taught courses only.

MPIC Entry Requirements

This programme is restricted to a limited number of participants. Bearing in mind that there is NO DIRECT ENTRY AT THE GRADUATE LEVEL, the minimum requirements for consideration at the undergraduate level are:

- Good performance in CAPE or 'A' Level Examination in French
- First year registration for FREN1001 and FREN1002
- GOVT1000 and GOVT1008
- A GPA of 2.5 and above for the first year

Applicant Eligibility: Eligible applicants in the Level One cohort of students who are proficient in the French language and are also performing well in relevant Social Science disciplines.

Application Period: During the month of April of the students' first academic year.

➤ MASTER OF PHILOSOPHY (MPhil)

The MPhil in Government is offered by thesis only. However, candidates are expected to attend class seminars *and* at least two research seminars**.

Minimum Entry Requirements for MPhil

This option is offered to students with at least a strong Second Class Honours (Upper Division) and who have shown a strong proficiency for research. Applicants are required to submit a research proposal along with their application which should be completed online via the Office of Graduate Studies & Research website at <http://www.uwimona.edu/postgrad>.

MPhil Programme Structure

Candidates are normally required to do 6 credits of courses before embarking on their thesis, but may be asked to do additional courses. Candidates must also meet research seminar requirements (not inclusive of presentations for prescribed courses). In cases, where a candidate has successfully completed any of the prescribed courses (see below) in another graduate programme, alternate courses at the graduate level should be selected. Candidates however MUST seek permission/approval from the Department.

➤ DOCTOR OF PHILOSOPHY (PhD)

The PhD in Government is offered by thesis only. However, candidates are expected to attend class seminars *and* at least three research seminars**. Normal entry into this programme is via the Masters of Philosophy degree (MPhil). Candidates who have made significant progress on their dissertation may be upgraded to the PhD on the recommendation of a special graduate studies committee. Direct entry may be considered for exceptional candidates who possess a solid background in social sciences theory and methodology with strong recommendations from at least three academic references. Applications submitted via the Office of Graduate Studies & Research website at <http://www.uwimona.edu/postgrad> should include the candidate's research proposal.

PhD Programme Structure

If candidates are accepted by the direct entry, they are normally required to do 9 credits of courses before embarking on their thesis, but may be asked to do additional courses (See list of prescribed courses for MPhil).

** Candidates must register for these seminars in the appropriate semester when their presentations are scheduled.

> MASTER OF SCIENCE IN GOVERNMENT (MSc)

This Programme operates on a three semester system, that is, from Semester 1 of one academic year to the end of Semester I, of the next academic year. The aims of the MSc Government (IR & CPIPT) programme are:

- **The Comparative Politics and Political Theory (CPIPT)**
 - i) Provide graduate students with advanced proficiency in the comparative assessment of political systems across the world;
 - ii) Provide an opportunity for graduate students to engage contemporary political theory, democracy and democratization, gender, political institutions and political development and transitional justice.
- **The International Relations (IR)**
 - i) Prepare students with knowledge and skills required as global citizens operating in an international market place. Further, it integrates regional knowledge and expertise in international affairs with cutting edge applied social science research;
 - ii) Offer candidates the required level of preparation to enter a PhD programme or to advance professionally in this field.

GENERAL ENTRY REQUIREMENTS (MSc Government and MSc IPDM)

(See Department's Graduate Handbook for detailed entry requirements for each Specialization (<http://www.uwimona.edu.jm/government>))

The requirements for admission to the MSc Government is an upper second class degree or better- GPA of 3.0 or above in a relevant discipline with sound undergraduate coverage in the particular sub-field of concentration. In exceptional cases where students are admitted without appropriate fundamentals, candidates would audit undergraduate courses as departmental requirements.

Applicants without an undergraduate Major in Political Science/International Relations will need courses in International Relations, Public Policy and Management, Political Science, other Social Sciences and History, Philosophy and Law. Students must have a minimum of five courses from these disciplines averaging a GPA of 3.0. Course equivalents from other universities are accepted; auditing of courses might be recommended; work experience and/or strong recommendations and interviews can be considered for marginal or special cases. Good communication/writing/referencing and research skills are considered. Applicants apply online via the Office of Graduate Studies & Research website at (<http://myspot.mona.uwi.edu/postgrad/>).

PROGRAMME DURATION (MSc Government and MSc IPDM)

Prescribed period to complete programme:

- Full time - three semesters, or 15 months
- Part-time - six semesters or 30 months

BRIEF GUIDE TO REGISTRATION – 2022/2023 ACADEMIC YEAR

Log on to the UWI Website: www.mona.uwi.edu

On the home page click on CURRENT STUDENTS

On the Current Students page locate the heading ONLINE SYSTEMS

Click the sub-heading SAS (Student Administration System)

1. Click **Enter Secure Area**.

2. Log in with User name and password.

User name: (ID#/REGISTRATION#)

Default password: (Date of Birth- Format YYYYMMDD)

3. Click on the **Student Services** Link

4. Click on the **Registration** Link

5. Choose the selection which says: **Look Up Classes to Add**

6. Choose the option: **Search by term and select 2020/2021 Semester I**

Please note that you will have to register for each Semester separately

On the “look up classes to add page”

7. **Choose Subject Area** in the subject field

8. Click **Course Search**

9. Once the course listings page appears, click the “view sections” button beside the course you wish to select.

Click in the check box provided beside the appropriate course section

(PLEASE NOTE THAT YOU WILL BE REQUIRED TO SELECT THE TUTORIAL AND LAB IF APPLICABLE FOR EACH COURSE)

10. Click **Register** to add the course to your registration

OR

10b. Once the course listing page appears, write down the CRN for each course you wish to add. **Click add to worksheet and place the CRN in the add/drop page then go to step 10**

11. Repeat the procedure for **2022/2023 Semester II by following steps 3-10**

The course selection page will list all the courses selected, and show that you are **Web Registered for those courses where the criteria has been satisfied.*

Web Registration Errors

- You will see **error** messages for those courses where the criteria were not satisfied and an **override** is required to select the course.
- At the bottom of the page, you will be able to request the necessary override(s), by clicking on the **Request Override Button**.
- Once the override is requested the system will submit the results to the faculty for their appropriate response.
- After this is done, *keep checking back to make sure that approval is granted*, at which point you may then add the course to your selections.
- **Schedule Type Error** – If the course that you are trying to add to your registration has a tutorial and or Lab, a **Schedule Type Error Message** will appear. In addition to the course you will be required to select a tutorial and or lab.

TROUBLESHOOTING ISSUES

Help, I can't log-in!!

- *Make sure that you've entered the correct default password, that is, your birthdate using the format YYYYMMDD. New Graduate students should ensure that they have accepted their offer online*
- *Returning students who have forgotten their password may call the MITS help Desk (927-2148, 935-8739) to request that their password be reset.*

I'm having problems requesting a course override

- *The Request overrides page is linked to your add/drop courses page, so, unless you've attempted to add the course to your record using the add/drop page (and had received an error), that course will not be available to you in the drop-down listing on the request overrides page.*
