<u>Principal's Address – 2018 Matriculation and Welcome Ceremony</u>

Sixty-three per cent (63%) of CARICOM's population comprises young people under the age of 30 years. Our reality in Jamaica and the region is not that youth are the future, you are the present. Your education, holistic development, safety, security, health, innovation and creativity, are the foundations on which we have to build sustainable communities, countries and a united region.

Therefore, the significance of today goes far beyond your personal achievement and extends to a national and regional imperative. I encourage the qualified and deserving candidates who are fortunate to be offered admission into this institution, young or old, to count yourselves as ambassadors of progress in the present and guardians of the future.

UWI at 70 and Beyond – Planning for the Future

For the 2018/2019 academic session, a total number of 18,800 students – roughly 900 enrolled at our growing Western Jamaica Campus – have selected and continue

We are proud to be a *bonafide* top-ranking institution ranked among the very best in Latin America and the Caribbean.

This positions us as a centre of excellence providing high quality teaching and learning experiences, which will engender the production of world class graduates capable of impacting their environment and being globally competitive.
