OVERVIEW

During the 2020-2021 academic year (AY), the activities of the Institute for Gender and Development Studies – Regional Coordinating Office (IGDS–RCO) continued to be governed by its theme of Research, Activism, Community Engagement and Education (RACE), in support of fulfilling the objectives of The UWI's Triple A Strategy and its critical pillars of Access, Agility and Alignment. The IGDS-RCO remained guided by its Mission "To produce and disseminate knowledge to transform gender relations in the Caribbean, in support of The UWI's mission to enhance regional and international development" and Vision of ensuring that "All UWI graduates are committed to social justice and the promotion of gender-responsive human relations and development". Amid the accompanying challenges of the COVID-19 pandemic, the staff must be commended for being responsive, innovative and working assiduously to successfully achieve many of the established objectives.

The highlights for the review period, included the implementation of a weekly regional IGDS Workshop Series for Graduate Students to support students learning and which tapped the expertise of the IGDS Units on the various campuses. For the first time, an IGDS Regional Information Session was organised to market the offerings of the various Units. The IGDS - RCO also established strategic partnerships with the UNDP Spotlight Initiative to complete the Pillar 1.1.1 "Legislative Reform to Eliminate Violence Against Women and Girls" project; UNESCO to undertake the Caribbean Sheroes Initiative Honouring Our Sheroes launch, a key output of which was a Knowledge Tool Kit; and the Association of Caribbean Women Writers and Scholars (ACWWS) to host the "Writing about Caribbean Gender and Social Justice Virtual Conference" from January 15 and 16, 2021 with global participation. Additionally, seven webinars were convened on diverse topics and outreach and advocacy continued at the individual and institutional levels.

ACCESS

TEACHING, LEARNING & STUDENT DEVELOPMENT

The following degrees in Gender & Development Studies were offered during the AY: a postgraduate Diploma; an M.Sc. (with Research paper or a three-month internship and report); an MPhil; and a PhD. Seven graduate courses were offered via the Zoom platform and were taught by Drs. Dalea Bean, Natasha Mortley, and Imani Tafari-Ama. Prof. Opal Palmer Adisa delivered guest lectures. Nine (9) new students were registered for the AY; five (5) MScs, three (3) MPhils, and one (1) in the Diploma programme. Thirty-three (33) students were enrolled in the combined programmes for the AY. One MSc student was presented at the graduation ceremony held in November 2020. One student, Lauren Marsh, successfully defended his PhD thesis and another, Carol Watson-Williams, secured the upgrade to the PhD. The IGDS - RCO continued to provide strategic developmental and capacity-building opportunities for students. Spearheaded by Dr. Dalea Bean, a regional weekly IGDS Workshop Series for Graduate Students was implemented. A range of topics, including Critical Reading & Writing and Data Collection, among others were covered. Lecturers from all of the Units, including the IGDS-RCO, facilitated the sessions. Kathryn Chan from the IGDS - St. Augustine Unit provided technical and marketing support. Also, one MPhil/PhD seminar was held on Thursday, May 6, 2021, two students presented on their research topics.

STUDENTS

Stacy Palmer, an MSc student became the third recipient of the Catherine James Scholarship. The IGDS-RCO continued to market its programmes using various approaches, including the Graduate Ambassador Programme (GAP) which facilitates the involvement of graduates in mentorship, networking and marketing the programmes of the Institute in the social and the print media. A pilot Regional Information Session was held on March 12, 2021. Organised by Dr. Dalea Bean, the session targeted prospective students and partners, and was aimed at enhancing the visibility of the IGDS and regional synergies.

ALIGNMENT

Significant emphasis was placed on promoting greater activism and public advocacy and broadening the impact of research through a range of outreach efforts and projects undertaken to fulfil developmental objectives and UN goals. Members of staff both organised and presented at various conferences across national, regional and international levels and also made several media appearances. At The UWI, Prof. Opal Palmer Adisa as chair of the Gender Mainstreaming Committee (GMC) continued to lead the implementation of The UWI Gender Policy.

PROJECTS

The Institute was involved in two major research funded projects and won two additional awards. Projects undertaken during the period include:

I. The UNDP Spotlight Initiative Pillar 1.1.1 "Legislative Reform to Eliminate Violence Against Women and Girls" project commenced in December 2020 and ended in July 2021. It was valued at USD 45,000 and was led by Prof. Opal Palmer Adisa and managed by Dr. Imani Tafari-Ama. Project outputs included a media campaign, a training manual, training of approximately 50 persons from various civil society organisations (CSOs) and a Round Table.

- II. The UNESCO Caribbean Sheroes Initiative launch event was a two-part project, an event launch and the production of a Knowledge Tool Kit. The project, valued at USD 6500 launched the Caribbean Sheroes Initiative on April 29, 2021 via UWItv's YouTube and Facebook page. The event highlighted the contributions of twelve (12) outstanding CSOs that work to advance gender justice and equality. Two Gender Equality Champions, Linnette Vassell and Joan French were also recognized. The Knowledge Tool Kit featured the work of those that were honoured. The project lead was Prof. Opal Palmer Adisa and the project manager was Dr. Bronty Liverpool-Williams.
- **III.** The US Public Diplomacy Small Grants Project valued at USD 24,000 was awarded to the IGDS—RCO to implement a dialogic island-wide performance-exhibition education campaign. Funds are expected to be disbursed in the new AY. The project is being led by Dr. Imani Tafari-Ama.
- IV. The UNESCO Summer School project valued at USD 14,000 was awarded in July 2021 and is expected to conclude in November 2021. Project outputs would include the development of a curriculum and training youths from the English-speaking and Dutch Caribbean.

VI. A regional forum, I.S.O.A.R Caribbean Youth Webinar: Caribbean Youth Perspectives on Adapting to COVID-19 was held on May 28, 2021 as part of the Child's Month activities. Youths shared their perspectives on Covid-19 and the volcanic activity in St. Vincent and the Grenadines (SVG).

VII. The IGDS-RCO in partnership with the Jamaica Council of Churches staged two one-day island-wide Thursday in Black Campaign to End GBV with Headlights in May and July 2021.

VIII. An art and creative writing competition for primary and secondary school students was launched in May as an outlet for children to use their creative talents to reflect on the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic on their social and educational development. Grace Kennedy sponsored the prizes.

INTERNATIONAL CENTRE FOR ENVIRONMENTAL & NUCLEAR SCIENCES

Departmental Report August 2020 - July 2021

OVERVIEW

The International Centre for Environmental and Nuclear Sciences (ICENS) entered the year with the COVID-19 pandemic impacting all aspects of operations of the Centre. Nonetheless there were highlights, achievements and continued progress. On September 30, 2020, the Director General was officially promoted to the rank of Professor of Applied Nuclear Sciences, recognizing his many years of contribution to academia and national development using nuclear technology. He was also awarded the Vice Chancellors Award for Excellence in Public Service. Dr. Adrian Spence was awarded the Principal's award for the research project with the greatest business potential. Mr Oshane Hamilton, scientific officer, was awarded a Chevening Scholarship to pursue his MSc in the Physics and Technology of Nuclear Reactors at the University of Birmingham. Under this new paradigm the Centre continued to meet its project targets where possible, including using the virtual space to commission equipment.

Students

The ICENS, has several staff members involved in student development and teaching, though the Centre in not an academic department. Throughout the period in review Mr. Haile Dennis continued his duties as an adjunct lecturer of Electrical Power (Nuclear) Engineering in the Faculty of Engineering.
