OVERVIEW

The repositioning of the School of Education (SOE) continued in the academic year 2018/2019. Specifically there was an emphasis on curriculum renewal, active pursuit of multi-modal delivery of courses and programmes, efforts to increase research and publications output and measures for the strategic recruitment and deployment of staff to support the development and change defined in the repositioning plan of the School.

TEACHING AND LEARNING

Two members of faculty were elevated to the position of senior lecturer.

The staff members of the School of Education continue to score very highly in the area of teaching: the average score is more than 4.0.

The external review team that led the Quality Assurance exercise in April 2018 observed that "the . . . SOE [is] a well-equipped educational institution, which . . . has emerged as a school well suited for its designated purpose." As such "the SOE must find a way to provide programmes that are relevant to the people". The School continues to be responsive to market needs, developing courses and programmes that are relevant to the society. Students' performance in undergraduate and graduate programmes for 2018–2019 are recorded in Tables 1–3.

STRENGTHENING NATIONAL ENGAGEMENT AND INTERNATIONAL COLLABORATION

Talk The Poem

The annual Talk the Poem National Poetry Recitation Competition (TTP) was held between January and April 2019. At the beginning of the 2018/2019 academic year, the Director of the Jamaica Library Services expressed an interest in partnering with the Talk the Poem National Poetry Recitation Project and this resulted in the formation of a partnership between both entities – the School of Education, UWI, Mona and the Jamaica Library Service of Jamaica. This partnership created the opportunity for the TTP County levels of the Competition to be held at the parish libraries located in Manchester, Kingston and St Andrew and St. James. March 11–15, 2019.

The TTP National finals was held on April 9, 2019 at the Philip Sherlock Centre for the Performing Arts, at the University of the West Indies, Mona Campus. There were fifteen finalists representing the top five participants from each county. The winner of the 2019 competition was Daindra Harrison of Ardenne High school who received a full three-year scholarship to The University of the West Indies, Faculty of Humanities and Education. Daindra will also receive an annual stipend of two hundred thousand dollars (\$200,000) from The UWI. Through TTP's partnership with Talking TreesLiterary Festival, held in St. Elizabeth in May 2019, Daindra was invited to be a

part of the poetry reading session with distinguished poets from across the Caribbean and the diaspora. TTP continues to find creative ways to partner with those who will help to prepare a future generation of poets for the Caribbean region.

PRINCIPALS' BREAKFAST MEETING

The School of Education Breakfast Meeting with school principals was held on August 30, 2018. The guest speaker was Minister of State in the Ministry of Education, Youth and Information, Mr. Floyd Green. Other invited guest speakers included: The Immediate Past Campus Registrar of The University of the West Indies Mona Campus, Dr. Camille Bell-Hutchinson, the Executive Director of the National Education Inspectorate (NEI), Mrs. Maureen Dwyer, Senior Director of Standards, from the University Council of Jamaica (UCJ), Mrs. Karen Gayle. The theme of the Breakfast Meeting was Preparing Teachers for 21st Century Learners.

MIXED METHODS RESEARCH

The third regional conference was hosted by the *Mixed Methods Research International Research Association – Caribbean Chapter from* March 26–28, 2019 at the Arthur Lok Jack Global School of Business, Max Richards Drive, Trinidad. The theme of the conference was *Integrating Qualitative and Quantitative Approaches: Tensions, Challenges and Possibilities*. Approximately 200 participants attended.

STEM PRESENTATION

Senior Lecturer in Science Education, Dr. Aldrin Sweeney, presented the 4th annual distinguished lecture of the Faculty of Humanities and Education on Thursday, April 11, 2019. Dr. Sweeney's presentation was entitled: *Taking STEM Education to the Next Level: Implications of Nanotechnology-Biotechnology, Information technology and Cognitive Science (NBIC) Converging Technologies for Developing Countries.* The lecture addressed the current status of STEM education in developing countries and suggested strategies for a more coherent integration of STEM education approaches at the secondary and tertiary education levels and discussed several implications of NBIC converging technologies for developing countries in the 21st century.

GRADE NINE MATHEMATICS PROBLEM SOLVING COMPETITION

The annual Grade 9 Mathematics Problem-solving competition was held on Thursday, April 11, 2019. The competition, which began in 2002 is designed to promote critical thinking, problem-solving, and collaborative working skills among students, drew participation of approximately thirty high and junior high schools across Jamaica. The design of the competition involves students from each school working in groups of

four to work of real life problems that require mathematical thinking in order to solve them. The top three schools of this year's competition include: Mount Alvernia High School – 1st place, Calabar High School – 2nd place and Glenmuir High School – 3rd place.

EDUCATION FOR SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT

The Education for Sustainable Development Working Group held a joint workshop with colleagues from London South Bank University and the University of Gloucestershire on ESD and Assessment Practices in Higher Education, May 2–3, 2019.

As part of UWI Research Days 2019, an ESD Forum was hosted under the theme 'Education for Sustainable Development: For Whom and For What', with panel presentations from Dr. Carol Hordatt Gentles, Mrs. Vileitha Davis-Morrison, Dr. Therese Ferguson, and Dr. Canute Thompson. The Forum was moderated by Dr. Aldrin Sweeney.

TVET CONFERENCE

The School of the Education staged the fourth International Conference on TVET at the Hilton Rose Hall Hotel and Spa in Montego Bay from May 22 to 24, 2019. The theme of the conference was: TVET Towards the 21st Century Economy: Principles, Strategies and Work Practice. Pro Vice Chancellor and Campus Principal Professor Dale Webber was the guest speaker at the conference. There were over two hundred (200) participants. Registered participants for workshops and plenary sessions and exhibit booths were part of the features of the conference. As a result approximately 285 persons were registered participants hailing from Jamaica and the rest of the Caribbean region, the United States of America, Canada, Nigeria and India. There were also 4 exhibit booths with exhibitors from the USA and Jamaica.

DUDLEY GRANT EARLY CHILDHOOD RESOURCE CENTRE

Two projects were managed by the Dudley Grant Early Childhood Resource Centre during the 2018–2019 academic year. The INSIGHTS in Jamaica Programme and the Early Interactions Project. Approximately \$26,000,000.00 dollars was acquired from CHASE Funds for the Early Interactions Project (EIP) which involved the placement of trained early years coaches in nursery settings and day care centres to address issues relevant to global process quality within these settings. The acquisition for the funding of the EIP was recognized by the Principal. Zoyah Kinkead-Clark, Senior Lecturer in Early Childhood Education and Principal Investigator was awarded the Principal's Award for "Research Project Attracting The Most Research Funds".

COMMUNITY OUTREACH

The Joint Board of Teacher Education (JBTE)

The JBTE hosted a team of Officers from the Ministry of Education, Belize headed by the Chief Education Officer to discuss the development of a comprehensive plan for the improvement of literacy from pre-school to post-secondary in Belize. They visited basic, primary and high schools in Jamaica to observe best practices, and had a round table discussion with the Officers from the Curriculum Unit of the Ministry of Education, Youth and Information on literacy initiatives by the Ministry.

Vetting of test papers successfully completed at Church and Shortwood Teachers' Colleges in preparation for final examinations. Lecturers representing the 8 colleges associated with the JBTE concluded the exercise attended by the Manager of the JBTE.
