OVERVIEW

A year which saw a slow recovery from the COVID-19 pandemic, the Department was stretched thin. More than eight members of staff were infected, with the HOD, severely affected. Most frustrating was the inability to fund the most basic of expenditures. Indeed, the lack of control over all elements of the financial and human resources proved to be a major bugbear. The embarrassing impoverished situation of the University and Campus, was disproportionately borne by the Department. Indeed, the DSPSW is not a net drain on the University. Yet, even in terms of its access to its own funds generated by the 'self-financing' programmes, it is at a disadvantages. One particular flash point was the refusal of the Bursary to allow for the use of a small amount of the funds from the 'milch cow' MSc HRD graduate programme to cover a temporary shortfall in the PhD OB, a course in the same Unit. Of course, the PhD OB is a magnet and enhances the image of the Department and overall HRD Graduate programmes, which administers both symbiotic programmes. Indeed, there is reason to believe that the very existence of the PhD OB, positively affects the enrolment and prestige of the MSc. More perplexing is that the University made the Department's funds available to do other non DSPSW things, which are not remotely connected to the Department. Indeed, at present there are unpaid invoices for work done to enhance the Department's output. Commendations to the administrative and staff, who performed yeoman work despite some contractual challenges some have faced. Some academics have had reduced contracts, as the instructions were given to advertise some of their posts.

Despite the caution that any reduction of contract can be seen as a dismissal and that any advertisement of the post of an incumbent is tantamount to notice of dismissal; up to the time of the departure of the outgoing Head of Department, no definitive response has been given to what seems to be a breach of the current labour laws and standards. It was also noted that 'contracts for services' for full time academic staff were in fact 'disguised contracts' as declared by the International Labour Organisation. Therefore, it must be noted that given the existing research and body of work of the HOD, the opposition to one member of staff being re-engaged under this label must be recorded. Nonetheless, the year saw the promotion/advancement of three (3) persons, bringing the total number of promotions since 2016 to 22.

Of note, it would be disingenuous not to acknowledge the distraction of energy to right a wrong, which took two years for the University to be forced to act properly and follow its own rules, in an ongoing matter involving the HOD. This had an immense impact on the energy which could have been better used for the greater benefit of the Department. In many ways the anchor of the Department, as we navigated the pandemic, the HRD Unit operated with a skeleton staff of two, one of whom had a vulnerable contract. All teaching staff are adjunct, with the then HOD teaching a course as part of his load. One challenge was the crossing of signals regarding the other adjuncts, who due to what was perceived as a deliberate disregard for the 'retroactivity' admonition. Despite the evidence to the contrary, the contracts for a number of adjuncts were not approved. It took the end of the year for the matter to be resolved. The Unit was well prepared for the online and mixed teaching, with Miss Olivene Thomas having initiated many of the changes before the pandemic. Importantly, enrolment was consistent with the norm, as a number of students, who perhaps might not have been able to take up offers, benefitting from the remote delivery.

The completion rate for the last cohort was 90 percent and we saw one person, Zeudi Munroe, completing the PhD OB. Still, there are persons waiting to be paid for research and editing work, and this has impeded the publication of at least one monograph/edited collection.

Social Work Unit

The Academic Year 2021/22 for the Social Work Unit was both interesting and trying however the staff as usual were up to the challenge. The support staff Ms Tameka Claudius (whose responsibilities include graduate

matters) and Ms. Tesi Scott (whose responsibilities include undergraduate matters) as usual worked tirelessly and pro-actively to ensure the administrative processes and deadlines were met. Mrs. Arna Elliott-Rattray continued to serve as the Undergraduate Unit Coordinator and Mrs. Kimberly Hinds-Heron continued in her role as Practicum Coordinator with the added responsibility of Graduate Coordination. Miss Sandra Latibeaudiere continued as coordinator of the SWU. The Social Work Unit was contracted to do capacity-building training for over 30 hospital Social Workers to manage social cases. The consultancy was for six (6) months February 26 to August 25, 2021. Special Projects in the Bursary managed the consultancy.

External Collaboration

The Sickle Cell Support Foundation of Jamaica, led by Camille Daley, launched its 30th Anniversary Sickle Cell Scholarship and Bursary Programme in June 2022. The programme will assist needy students, with sickle cell disease, access tertiary and post-secondary education starting in September 2022. Dr Doreen Gordon since July 2022, is involved in a cross-faculty submission to the Caribbean Development Bank for a project on "Early Warning Systems, Capacity Building and Resilience in Coastal and Watershed Communities in the face of Climate Change. Since July 2022, Dr Gordon has been involved in a cross-faculty submission to the Caribbean Development Bank for a project on "Early Warning Systems, Capacity Building and Resilience in Coastal and Watershed Communities in the face of Climate Change." If the project is approved, it would bring revenue to the University of the West Indies and possibly funding for Mphil/PhD programmes in the Faculty of Social Sciences focused on the theme of Climate Change.

She was invited by the Pro Vice Chancellor of Graduate Studies Professor Rose-Marie Belle Antoine (now the new Principal of the UWI St Augustine Campus), to be part of the Caribbean Climate Smart Accelerator (CCSA) Investor Matchmaking Initiative. This will involve presenting the project proposal to potential investors at a Forum on the Blue Economy on September 6th, 2022. This could potentially bring revenue to the department and to the UWI. The MOU between the University of Cape Coast (UCC) and the University of the West Indies, (with the Department of Sociology, Psychology and Social Work, Mona Campus, with Dr. Michael Barnett as the pivot on this side of the waters and the Centre of International Education as the pivot for the University of Cape Coast, Ghana that was mentioned in last

year's report, are now formally linked. Dr Orville Taylor is also part of this Africentric collaboration and a trip to Ghana is on the agenda for next year as well as research. The Social Work Unit, facilitated by Dr Rogers, sought to re-establish the partnership with the University of Kwa Zulu Natal, Howard Campus. There was an existing MOU which has expired. An initial meeting was held on July 7, 2022, with Dr Sibonsile Zibane, Head, Social Work Discipline, Dr Tracie Rogers, Mrs Elliott-Rattray, Ms Tesi Scott and Ms Sandra Latibeaudiere. The envisioned partnership would entail staff and student exchanges, sharing of best practices in practicum, and guest lectures. \

Staff Movement

Dr Taylor ended his term as Head of Department, Mr Colin Williams completes a year under a contract for services, Wendy Cooke McLean returns in August 2022, having completed her PhD. Unfortunately, two (2) 'built from within' assistant lecturers, Neena Albarus and Nicola Williams both resigned to go to greener grasses. The Department welcomed the addition of Dr LeQuay, who replaced Dr Marina Ramkissoon, who was transferred to the Registry to fill the position of Director of Human Resource Management.
